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SELF-STUDY COURSES - 2021-22

In order to enhance the efficiency of the prospective teachers in the domains of reading, grasping, critical viewing and application for life, the college offers sufficient space for self-learning courses. The prospective teachers are expected to choose any course indicated by the college for their self-study and achieve a reasonable acquisition of knowledge and skills.

Course Learning Outcomes

The college offers the following self-study courses:

Duration

The duration of self- study course is 50 hours with a combination of theory and practical. However, the combination of theory and practical shall be decided by the course-coordinator with the approval of the Principal.

Examination and Evaluation

Self-study courses are purely internal and the examination is conducted by the course-coordinator in consultation with the Principal; the answer scripts are valued by the course-coordinator. The evaluation consists of internal test (5 marks), assignment (5 marks) and practicum (5 Marks) for 15 marks and a terminal examination for 35 marks.

Awarding Certificate

The students who successfully complete the self-study courses shall be issued certificates by St. Xavier's College of Education (Autonomous), Palayamkottai.

Guidelines

- Self-study courses are obligatory for the completion of the B.Ed programme.
- The prospective teachers must choose one of the three self-study courses offered by the college.
- The self-study course should be completed in the first year of B.Ed Programme.
- For each self-study course, one faculty is appointed to accompany the students.
- A minimum of two hours is allotted in the regular timetable.
